






### Dashboard

To get to the **dashboard** I need to click on "**My Sites**". Dashboard is where all the things main things are located.






## **WP Admin**






# **One Account Multiple Sites**

I can click on any of these sites in order to access their dashboard.








# Content

New blog post:




Once the title and the blog content is completed, the next step is:

- deciding to save it as a draft in order to come back and add more content at a later time (actually the content auto-saves the post as a draft from the get go),
- to publish immediately
- or to schedule a post to go at a later date and time.

Posts can also be password protected, so only the people who know the password can access your content.
