



Indicates the default tool. Items below show are more ways to utilize the tool.



- **Open Drop –Down Menu**: Clickable button to open images to start editing
- Image Tab: Clickable tabs for switching between different opened images
- Editing Modes (quick, guided or expert): Clickable buttons to show different editing modes with different features (expert shown)
 - Quick: common tools and optimization commands
 - Guided: step-by-step instructions for fixes and editing with special effects
 - Expert: full use of toolbox and commands without additional directions or help
- Panels Bin: panels are the resizable windows that hold commands.
 Available in expert and guided modes
- Photo Bin: Enables one to open and work with multiple photos
- Tools: The toolbar features clickable icons that represent your editing tools.
 The tools change depending on which mode you are working in
- Task Bar: the bottom bar on your screen that contains buttons for displaying or hiding panels, executing common commands, and switching views.
