Conversation Questions

1. Should internet access be considered a public utility, which is accessible evenly among all customers through regulation, or a commodity, which is accessible through supply and demand?
2. To what degree should a government be involved in the regulation of the internet?

Key Definitions (from Merriam-Webster Dictionary)

- *net neutrality* – the idea, principle, or requirement that internet service providers should or must treat all internet data as the same regardless of its kind, source, or destination
- *Internet service provider* – a company that provides its customers with access to the internet and that may also provide other internet-related services (such as email accounts)
- *Federal Communications Commission* – independent agency charged with regulating all interstate and foreign communications by radio, television, wire, satellite, and cable
