

Twitter: What is it?



A social media platform













Who uses this?

- Private individuals
- Celebrities and other public personas
- Businesses (big and small; local and international)
- News and other media agencies





















For what purposes?

- Connect with others
- Voice opinions
- Release statements
- Share/promote their work
- Re-post the links to other social media accounts





How do I use this?





Write your "original" tweet.

- Example:
- Today is a sunny day.





@ (at) sign

- Used to mention someone or reply to someone in a tweet.
- Example:
- @tomhanks You are awesome!





@ (at) sign

- Example:
- Today is a sunny day so I might go on a picnic. I better stop by @SkokieLibrary to grab some books.





Add Media.

- Attach photos (.jpg, .png, .gif format file size 5 MB max)
- Attach videos (links to YouTube.com with full play time, or upload .mp4 & .mov format with 30 seconds max play time & file size 512MB max)





Add links.

• It is possible to add link to various other websites and news sites, etc.





Re-tweet

- If someone has posted something you can re-tweet their content to your profile.
- Re-tweets are visible to your followers.
- Re-tweets link to the original content.





DM - Direct Message

- DM (direct messages) are private messages between two Twitter accounts.
- Most accounts require users to follow them in order to send & receive DMs.
- Some accounts allow settings to be changed so it accepts DMs from any account.





Report

- Spam
- Abusive or harmful content
- Impersonation
- Copyright & trademark violations



Mute

- Removing Tweets from timeline (similar to Facebook feature)
- Does not mean account will be blocked or unfollowed



Block

- Unable to send @ replies and DMs
- Unable to follow
- Not alerted to block unless they visit your profile
