
What is the funniest thing you've found on the shelves?

Basics of Selecting Materials for the Library

Here are a few of the factors our staff use to decide whether we should purchase any particular item:

- Is the author or subject popular in our community?
- Has it received good reviews?
- Do we already have something very similar to it?
- Does it represent a viewpoint not already well represented by our other materials?
- Is it new information in a field where knowledge changes quickly?
- Do we have space for it?
- Is it the best use of available funds?



Basics of "Deselecting" Library Materials

Sometimes the decision to withdraw an item is easy, sometimes it is difficult. Here are some of the factors involved:

- Is the content inaccurate or misleading?
- Is the item worn out or damaged beyond repair?

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- Has a new edition been published?
- Is a newer or more comprehensive book on the same subject now available?
- Have people checked out this item?
