

Currently reading I Am Not Starfire by Mariko Tamaki and There Will Be No Miracles Here by Casey Gerald and listening to a million podcasts


Advice to my teenage self: "Put the same amount of effort and time into your hobbies as you do your academics because you just might discover your gift."






Working with Our Schools

We don't simply wait for any of you to reach out to the library when you need us—we also work with Skokie schools and their staffs to bring library services to all of our kids in their school classrooms and libraries. We reached out to Lisa Talbert of Highland School to find out how we help make her job easier and improve learning for the kids in her school. Here's what she told us.

The Best Things the Library Offers



She went on to mention the sheer quantity of print books and eBooks the library makes available: "When a class is doing research and we need enough books for everyone, the library has plenty to provide a variety of books on the topic."

Third, Lisa talked about our staff's helpfulness in making excellent recommendations and even going above and beyond on occasion to deliver books to the school when there is a last-minute need.

Lisa has also found that the meetings of all of the school librarians in Skokie, which are coordinated by Lorrie, our school services librarian, result in great ideas and book suggestions from her colleagues.



What Has Changed?

Lisa is in her 10th year working at Highland School, and she remembers being in touch with our staff liaison as early as her first week on the job. During her first year, we worked with District 68 to test how we could get every student a library card. The process has been fine-tuned and expanded to all the schools over the years, and Lisa says, "now it's a breeze to make sure every student in our school gets a library card."

Lisa is clearly a big fan of our school services, so much so that she would love to be able to offer more library services to the kids in her school: "more book talks, more puppet shows, more deliveries of books." Our staff members really love doing all of these things, too!

Lisa once asked to borrow a telescope for a family reading night the school was sponsoring. The answer was "yes." Lisa says she has Lorrie's email on "speed dial" because our school services librarian can either help her or knows who can and how to make it happen!

In addition to Lorrie, who specializes in working with K–8 schools, we also have staff who specialize in working with preschools and daycares, as well as kids with special needs. They provide direct services to teachers and schools, and they facilitate work by other library staff to lead events in the schools, such as puppet shows and book talks, and schedule tours for school classes.




