Serving families

Holly and Laura often lead family literacy nights, when they share early literacy tips directly with parents and caregivers. They also host occasional family engagement events at the library in conjunction with specific schools or programs. More ways we help include preparing specialized book lists for parent support groups and donating withdrawn books to schools, to the park district's little free libraries, and to the Niles Township Food Pantry.

Serving our early childhood teachers

We prepare about 120 bags of books and related materials for early childhood centers based on themes the teachers request.

Last April, we held an interactive workshop on storytime engagement strategies for 18 local early childhood teachers. The workshop helped them become more confident in creating engaging and age-appropriate storytimes, and we hope this pilot can be expanded over time to reach more teachers and child care providers.

Laura writes a monthly email for about 300 teachers alerting them to topical or seasonal resources for their classrooms and providing other early literacy tips. And because we are aware of great new books being published for kids, we share that awareness with teachers through periodic book talks. The bookmobile also makes special stops at early childhood centers when feasible.

We visit early childhood centers between 15 and 25 times a year, and interns and staff members lead storytimes, preschool puppet playtime, dance parties, early math storytimes, and more.

Who wouldn't want the children in their lives to love learning and reading? Studies show that families that start reading aloud to their children early and often help strengthen their children's language skills and build their vocabularies. You don't need an official program to accomplish this—just read to your little one every day. We can help make it even more fun if you join Grow a Reader.

Sign up at the Kids desk. You'll get a set of sturdy activity cards on a ring
—it fits nicely on a diaper bag—
and a "seed packet" booklet. Color a seed in the booklet for each book you read. If you'd rather join online, sign up and track your progress using Beanstack:

skokielibrary.info/growareader. For every 100 books, you can put your child's first name on a wall at the library. You'll also get a fresh seed packet and a new activity card. There's a special prize at 1,000 books.

Reading 1,000 books sounds like a lot, but if you read a book a day, it will take less than three years. Three books a day? Less than a year! All books count. Little ones sometimes want to hear you read the same book over and over, and that's fine. It is not a competition. Just getting into the habit of reading every day will set your child up for a lifetime of loving books. We have thousands of board books and picture books to choose from, and an expert staff happy to help find the books your child will love.

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Building Early Literacy Skills with Young Children

You might be surprised how much the simple things you already do with your child every day help get them ready to read!



Your child loves your voice, and they need to hear language in order to learn it. Describe what you see, hear, smell, and taste like a sportscaster! Ask your child questions and respond to what they say.

It doesn't matter if you can't carry a tune!

Music teaches rhythm, which is an essential
part of language. Sing the alphabet song and
nursery rhymes. Make up silly songs about what
you're doing. Listen to the radio and clap along.



Read whatever books you have at home, or pick some up at the library. Read aloud in whatever language you're most comfortable with. It's ok to reread the same book again and again! Ask questions about the pictures and follow the words with your finger.



Scribbling, drawing, and learning the shapes are all part of recognizing patterns, and that leads to reading. Any kind of mark making is fine. And make sure your child sees you writing so they can learn by example.



Through play, your child can put thoughts into words and talk about what they are doing. And because it's fun, your child loves doing it. Try peekaboo or I-spy!
