

How to Vote in Illinois

Voters with disabilities, get ready and vote in the Primary Election on or before June 28, 2022, with this voter guide, adapted by by LWVE using AAPD's REV UP as main source.



1. Registering to Vote

- **How can I register to vote?** You can register online at Illinois's online portal https://illinoisvoterguide.org/ or by downloading and mailing this form: https://www.cookcountyclerkil.gov/sites/default/files/publications/ IVR%2520App%2520EN 2021 Online.pdf. If you have already registered, you can double-check your voter registration status at https:// illinoisvoterguide.org/.
- When do I need to register? Make sure to register by mail or online by June 10, or you can register in-person until May 31.
- Do I need an ID? You will likely need to have an Illinois address and an Illinois ID, or a social security number if you don't have a state ID. Can I vote if I have a disability? Yes! People with disabilities who are at least 18 years old have the right to vote. Your vote matters and is protected by laws to ensure voting is accessible, independent, and private. If you have a guardian, you can still vote. Contact your local protection and advocacy agency at

2. Learning about the Issues

• What people or laws can I vote for? Enter your home address in Ballotpedia's Sample Ballot Lookup to find out what is on your ballot.



3. Voting in Person

- Where do I need to go to vote? If you are registered to vote, you can find your polling place through this online portal.
- When can I vote? Illinois allows in-person early voting, so you can vote between June 13 and June 27 and avoid lines on election day!
- Can I vote from a car if the polling place is inaccessible? Yes, Illinois allows voters to request a ballot from a car, if a polling place is inaccessible. You will need to request curbside voting from your local polling place the day before.
- What if I want assistance with my ballot? You may choose someone (except your boss, union agent, or a candidate) to assist you in marking your ballot.
- **Do I need an ID?** No, you do not need to bring any ID to your polling place.

4. Voting by Mail

• Can I vote by mail? Any Illinois voter can vote by mail without an excuse. A new law passed this year is that a voter may now request to PERMANENTLY receive a vote-by-mail ballot until you advise Cook County otherwise.

• **How do I request a mail ballot?** You must request a ballot through your local county clerk or board of election commissioners. Access the vote by mail ballot application here:

- When do I need to request my ballot? Your vote by mail request must be received by the Election Authority by June 23, but request your ballot <u>as</u> <u>soon as possible</u> to make sure that your ballot is received on time!
- How do I fill out my ballot? Illinois plans to allow voters with disabilities to request an electronic absentee or Vote by Mail ballot that can be completed electronically and then printed out, but this system is not available yet. Make sure to sign your ballot or envelope when prompted, since Illinois requires this signature to match your past signature. If receiving assistance, the person assisting you may need to sign an affidavit on the ballot.
- What if I want assistance with my ballot? You may choose someone
 (except your boss, union agent, or a candidate) to assist you in marking
 your ballot. Someone assisting you may need to complete an affidavit to be
 returned with the paper ballot.
- How do I return my ballot? Return your ballot by mail to your local elections office. In some counties, you can deliver your ballot to a drop box. Your ballot must be hand delivered by June 28 or postmarked by June 28 and received by July 5, so request your ballot as soon as possible if you plan to vote by mail!
- **Do I need an ID?** You may need to provide an ID when requesting a vote by mail ballot.
- Can I track my ballot? Contact your <u>local elections office</u> to track your vote by mail ballot.
