

Let's Sing and Dance

You put your right mitten in

Try a bouncy rhyme. (credit: Intellidancing)

Knee bounces are so much fun and help develop your child's balance and vestibular system. This one is done best sitting on the floor with some space behind you.

Let's go on a sleigh ride through the snow (bounce from side to side) Up and down, up and down, away we go (bounce up and down) We climb so high to the snowy hill top (lift your child up) And woosh down the hill until we stop (roll backwards)

Play and Write

Cutting, tearing, and glueing are fun while also engaging those muscles children will later need to hold a pencil correctly for writing. It's also a wonderful way to improve your child's fine motor skills.
