Activist highlight: Freedom Summer, 120m - Check out from library

An exploration of the summer of 1964 where more than 700 student volunteers joined with organizers and local African Americans in a historic effort to register voters.

In this documentary from 2012, two designers/activists lead local high school students on a build project that show the power of design thinking to re-invent not just their community but their own sense of what's possible.

Activist highlight: The Most Dangerous Man in America, 94m - Stream on Kanopy

The Academy-Award nominated film follows Daniel Ellsberg, a high-level Pentagon official and Vietnam War strategist, who leaks 7,000 pages of top secret documents to the press. His actions led directly to one of America's most important free speech cases and the end of the Vietnam War.
